At Home with the Lord

f you feel a bit gloomy at the sight of Ash Wednesday on the calendar (March 5 this year), behold the day of salvation! As Saint Paul advised first-century Corinthians, accept God's grace. Paul set forth "now" as the acceptable time.

Now that almost two millennia have passed, we know that Paul didn't somehow get the date of salvation wrong. Instead, we acknowledge that, no matter what may befall us, faith can save the day.

Preparing for Salvation

Back in 2019, cameras captured images of the Cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris as firefighters focused on saving the church. People around the world watched on that Lenten day, hoping that more than ashes and heavy stone would remain.

For us, Lent provides a time to train our hearts on preparation for the day when Jesus comes again, desiring to find us ready.

Beyond the Ashes

In a full-page cover photo, the newspaper *La Croix (The Cross)* showed the spire of Notre-Dame falling, with billowing smoke in its place. Part of the roof collapsed next.
Although the somber headline declared, "The Heart in Ashes," thoughts already turned to the hopefilled work ahead.

Grime to Glory

Before the cathedral blaze, everyday grime had accumulated from dust, burning candles, and human traffic. Fire restoration work gloriously brightened paintings, sculpture, and stained glass. During Lent, we contemplate the spiritual cleansing received at Baptism. Where we have since become lackluster, we do some repentant work.

Five-plus years after the fire, the Archbishop of Paris knocked on the cathedral door with a crozier (shepherd's staff) made from charred wood, and Notre-Dame's doors reopened! Now comes our time to enter into Lent with an open heart.



Inspiring Blueprint

Home improvements range from repair to remodeling to adding a room. Back in 17th-century Amsterdam, adding onto one of the tall, narrow houses along crowded canal frontage required building at the back. So it happened with a dwelling known to this day as "Our Lord in the Attic."

hallenges to beliefs and authority of the Catholic Church led to offshoot denominations. Although law in the Netherlands allowed freedom of conscience. only Protestants could worship openly.

In the canal home of a Catholic merchant named Jan Hartman, upper floors directly connected the front house and two annexes. He had plenty of room for family, the flow of goods in his business, and, above all, a hidden church.

Quiz Time: Lent Q& A

1. What rules apply on days of fasting and abstinence, health permitting?

Fasting: From midnight at the end of a person's 18th birthday, through midnight at the end of the 59th birthday, fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting allows three meals, but two small meals together should amount to less than the full one. Liquids are allowed anytime.

Abstinence: Starting at midnight at the end of the 14th birthday, Catholics do not eat meat or poultry on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent. (On other Fridays of the year, you may choose a penance more meaningful for you.)

2. When does Lent begin and end this year?

Liturgically, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, **March 5**, and ends right before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, **April 17**, **2025**. Whatever you give up or do as a personal Lenten observance traditionally ends right before the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday, **April 19**, **2025**.

3. Does the Catholic Church require personal Lenten observances?

Canon (Church) law requires Catholics to do penance in their own ways and to abide by the rules for Ash Wednesday and Fridays. In keeping with Lent as a penitential **time of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving**, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has explained that Catholics are called to practice self-discipline throughout the Lenten season.

4. Do Catholics skip their individually chosen penitential practices on Sundays?

Canonically, Lent and all Fridays of the year are penitential times. Nevertheless, Catholics may skip individually chosen observances on Sundays in recognition of joy in the Resurrection celebrated every Sunday year-round.

Jubilee Year: March Focus

Every 25 years, the Catholic Church worldwide celebrates an Ordinary Jubilee—a Holy Year of forgiveness, indulgences, reconciliation, pilgrimage, conversion, and commitment to serving God. "Pilgrims of Hope," the theme for this year's Jubilee, evokes a faith journey. Like a road with many signs along the way, the 2025 Jubilee has days of focus each month.



March 8-9: Volunteers


March 28-29: "24 Hours for the Lord" March 28-30: Missionaries of Mercy
